The Whakatipu Music Festival was an initiative born out of the quiet of the Covid pandemic and the space it gave to hear ourselves think. The Board of the Hill Family Foundation for Arts and Music considered what was needed and how it could best give back to its beneficiaries, and one such initiative was a festival that recognised exceptional talent and that nurtured and raised up New Zealand's next generation of musicians on the cusp of, or at the start of, their careers.

We also recognise that the Foundation importantly helps to stimulate the arts and culture in the Whakatipu Basin. The 2023 Infometrics Creativity Index placed second for creativity in New Zealand – behind Wellington but ahead of Auckland. 5.64% of the workforce here is employed in the creative industries. The Hill Family Foundation for Arts and Music (that also presents the acclaimed Michael Hill International Violin Competition) is known for bringing world-class musicians to the district which attracts desirable cultural tourism. This Festival delivers that same outstanding experience to visitors and it also contributes to the efforts and achievements of the many local community organisations, educators and arts consumers who are driving awareness to the value the arts have in the community.

A festival of this complexity requires a great deal of skilled and passionate people to pull it off. Choirs Aotearoa

New Zealand is the organisation managing Actearoa's award-winning national choirs.

Established to promote excellence in choral singing, the organisation oversees three nationally renowned choirs: the New Zealand Youth Choir, Voices New Zealand Chamber Choir, and New Zealand Secondary Students' Choir. Each ensemble represents a different stage in a singer's development, providing opportunities for young and professional vocalists to train, perform, and collaborate on a national and international level.

Through innovative programming and artistic leadership, Choirs Aotearoa NZ brings a diverse range of choral music to audiences, blending traditional works with contemporary compositions, often highlighting the country's unique cultural heritage. Māori and Pasifika influences feature prominently in their repertoire, reflecting Aotearoa's rich musical identity.

The organisation also plays a vital role in the development of choral music in New Zealand through education and outreach initiatives. It delivers a national choral academy named Aotearoa Academy Choir, nurtures young singers, provides mentorship and professional development opportunities for conductors, composers and vocal coaches. It runs the annual 'Compose Aotearoa!' choral composition competition and regularly commissions new works and waiata from local composers, ensuring a vibrant future for choral music.

With a history of international acclaim and national recognition, our national choirs continue to inspire and elevate Aotearoa's choral scene, connecting communities through the power of stories and song.

It is an absolute pleasure to partner with this year's Whakatipu Music Festival to bring the art (and secrets) of ensemble singing to life together with young artists and our Artistic Director Emerita Karen Grylls.

Ioana Cristina Goicea Julian Smiles ROMANIA

VIOLIN

Ioana Cristina Goicea is one of the outstanding violinists of her generation and the First Prize Winner of the 2017 Michael Hill International Violin Competition, where critics praised her passionate performance and describing her as "a new star in the musical firmament." She was also the winner of the International German Music Competition (2018) and the J. Brahms International Competition (2013), and a laureate of the International Violin Competition of Indianapolis (2018), Queen Elisabeth Competition (2019); and the "Fritz Kreisler" International Violin Competition (2014).

Ms Goicea has performed as a soloist at renowned venues such as the Concertgebouw Amsterdam, Konzerthaus Berlin, St Martinin-the-Fields London, the Melbourne Recital Centre, Wiener Konzerthaus, Bozar Brussels, Meistersingerhalle Nürnberg, the Shanghai Concert Hall, the Athenaeum Bucharest, and the Auckland Town Hall.

Ioana Cristina was born into a family of musicians in Bucharest in 1992. She studied with Mariana Sirbu, Petru Munteanu and Krzysztof Wegrzyn at the Universities of Music Leipzig, Rostock and Hannover and is an avid chamber musician.

Ioana Cristina lives in Vienna where she is a Professor at the University of Music and Performing Arts and plays a J.B. Vuillaume violin, on loan from a generous private donor as well as a modern violin by Jürgen Manthey (Leipizig, 2021).



AUSTRALIA CELLO

Julian has occupied many of the most prestigious positions in the Australian classical music scene. He was for several years principal cellist with the Australian Chamber Orchestra and has performed frequently as guest principal cello with the Sydney Symphony Orchestra, the Tasmanian Symphony Orchestra and the Australian Opera and Ballet Orchestra.

In 1991 he was invited to join the Australia Ensemble, the University of New South Wales' acclaimed resident chamber music ensemble, and in 1995 formed the highly successful Goldner String Quartet with ensemble colleagues Dene Olding, Irina Morozova and Dimity Hall.

These two groups continue to be regarded as representing the pinnacle of chamber music in the country, and the Goldner Quartet in particular has established an international reputation with rave reviews of their recordings and performances in the UK. Julian is also frequently heard as a soloist and has performed concertos with the Melbourne and Canberra Symphony Orchestras, the Australian Chamber Orchestra, and several community orchestras in Sydney.

He has also performed as a soloist at the Australian Festival of Chamber Music and the Huntington Estate Music Festival, and premiered solo works by Australian composers such as Mark Isaacs, Carl Vine and Ross Edwards.

As a well-respected teacher, Julian draws on his many years of experience as a performer at the highest level, as well as his studies with Nelson Cooke, one of the most significant teachers in Australia, and with Janos Starker at Indiana University.



Bernadette Harvev AUSTRALIA PIANO

Acclaimed international pianist, Bernadette Harvey, was awarded the Centenary Medal in 2000 by then Australian Prime Minister, John Howard, for her contribution to Australian Music. Bernadette has won many accolades since her first medal in a Sydney Eisteddfod at the age of two and a half, including the ABC 'Young Performer of the Year' in 1987.

She has worked with such artists as the Dover Quartet, the Miró Quartet, Alexander Sitkovetsky, Ani Kavafian, Joseph Lin, Axel Strauss, Antonio Lvsv, Paul Coletti, Alan Vogel and David Schifrin. She presented the world premiere of Pierre Jalbert's Piano Quintet with the Jupiter Quartet, which she subsequently recorded in 2019 for the Canadian label Marguis. She also appeared with the Tokvo Quartet and the Shandhai Quartet in the premiere of Carl Vine's Piano Ouintet, Fantasia in 2013. She and the Shanghai Quartet later presented the Australian premiere of the Bright Sheng Piano Quintet, Dance Capriccio. She now joins her husband, Peter Rejto, as Co-Artistic director of the Tucson Winter Chamber Music Festival.

Bernadette has performed extensively for Musica Viva Australia including tours with cellist Jian Wang and the Goldner Quartet, Bernadette has recorded most of the solo piano music of Ross Edwards, one of Australia's most well-known and loved composers, who wrote his first piano sonata for her and a shorter two movement work, Sea Star Fantasy.

Bernadette has recently joined the Streeton Trio with violinist Emma Jardine and cellist Rachel Siu, cello, She has a DMA from Eastman and is Senior Lecturer in piano at the Sydney Conservatorium of Music.



Stephen De Pledge

PIANO

New Zealand pianist Stephen De Pledge won the Gold Medal at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama and subsequently spent two years as a Junior Fellow at the Royal College of Music. He then continued his studies in Paris with Yvonne Loriod.

After winning the NFMS Young Concert Artist Award, he made his debuts in the Wigmore Hall, Queen Elizabeth Hall and St John's Smith Square in London, and broadcast for BBC Radio 3 and BBC2 television. His concerto performances have included appearances with the Philharmonia, Bournemouth Symphony, New London, BBC Scottish Symphony and all the major New Zealand orchestras. His solo performances in recent seasons have taken him to Cologne, Paris and New York, as well as throughout New Zealand and Australia.

Stephen has given recitals with many musicians, including Dame Felicity Lott, Dame Evelyn Glennie, Viktoria Mullova, Raphael Wallfisch, Alan Hacker and Rivka Golani, and given chamber performances with the Berlin Philharmonic Wind Quintet, Chamber Domaine and the Scottish Ensemble. His extensive discography includes works by Bliss, Barber, Messiaen, Shostakovich, Brahms, Mussorgsky and Prokofiev. He takes a particular interest in contemporary music and has worked with a great number of composers, making world premiere recordings for Arvo Pärt, Henryk Gorecki and Ned Rorem.

In addition to his performing schedule Stephen De Pledge is Head of Piano at the School of Music, University of Auckland.



Dr Karen Grylls NEW ZEALAND CHORAL DIRECTOR & CONDUCTOR

Karen Grylls ONZM (1999), CNZM (2023) is an Honorary Associate Professor at the University of Auckland and is Artistic Director of the Choirs Aotearoa New Zealand Trust, the managing body for the NZ Youth Choir, NZ Secondary Students 'Choir, the Aotearoa Academy Choir and Voices NZ. In 1996 Auckland University honoured her with a Distinguished Teaching Award in Music. In 1999 she became an Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit (ONZM) and in 2023 she was awarded the King's Coronation Companion of the NZ Order of Merit (CNZM) for services to choral music. Karen was Conductor and Artistic Director of the New Zealand Youth Choir from 1989 to 2011. founded Voices New Zealand in 1998 and was Artistic Director of Toronto's Exultate Chamber Choir from 2011 to 2013.

Karen is much in demand as an adjudicator for competitions and festivals worldwide. She is sought after internationally as a choral clinician and regularly conducts masterclasses and workshops. Her performances with the Youth Choir and Voices NZ have won international competitions and awards: NZYC Choir of the World, Llangollen (1999), TOWER Voices CD Spirit of the Land took the 2006 Tui Award for Best Classical Album, and the CD Voice of the Soul was a finalist in the 2013 Vodafone NZ Music awards.

In August 2019 Karen was a plenary speaker at the Oxford Conducting Institute at the Sydney Conservatorium Conference. Online lecture appearances continue and have included the Sydney International Series (Gondwana). In 2025 Karen presented lectures online to Temple University Philadelphia and Nuorten Kuoroliitto Helsinki and she will be on the International Jury in Bali in July.



CONTRIBUTING ARTISTS

Ivan Zhang Tenor

Ivan is in his final year of a Bachelor of Music/Laws conjoint at the University of Auckland. As a soloist, Ivan has performed with Pakuranga Choral, the Holy Trinity Cathedral Choir, and Auckland Philharmonia. He has also performed in the chorus of New Zealand Opera's Le Comte Ory and Tristan und Isolde, and will be performing in this vear's La Bohème. Ivan is an alumnus of the 2025 New Zealand Opera School. This year, Ivan was the tenor soloist for Stainer's The Crucifixion with the Holy Trinity Cathedral Choir, and the tenor soloist for Mozart's *Requiem* with Cantando Choir.

As a chorister, Ivan is a member of the Voices New Zealand Chamber Choir, the St Matthew's Voices at St Matthew-in-the-City, and the New Zealand Youth Choir. Later this year, he will be competing with the Youth Choir at the European Choir Games in Denmark and the Llangollen International Eisteddfod in Wales.

Mark Bobb Baritone

Mark did his Performance Arts degree in London followed by Performance and Teaching diplomas at The Guildhall School of Music and Drama. He sang with Opera North in the UK after leaving college and before moving to NZ.

In NZ he has performed often with NZ Opera as well as had lead roles with Eternity Opera in Wellington, including the title role of *Don Giovanni*.

Mark sings with Voices NZ as well as number eight choir, an 8-voice a Cappella group set up by Voices NZ and coached by Chris Bruerton of The King's Singers.

Mark has conducted WELLSO (Wellington Late Starters Orchestra) for 9 years as well as a number of choirs in Wellington. He also performs with Jazz ensembles as a vocalist and violinist.

Gordon Hill doublebass

Gordon was born in Albuquerque, New Mexico, USA. He started playing the bass at age 14 and went to high school at the Interlochen Arts Academy. After graduating high school he attended the Cleveland Institute of Music and finished at the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston where he studied with Edwin Barker and Larry Wolfe.

He spent two summers with the National Repertory Orchestra, participated in the Spoleto Festival in Italy, and performed a season with the New World Symphony. Gordon has performed with the Boston Pops Orchestra, Dallas Symphony Orchestra, Los Angeles Philharmonic and the Sydney Symphony Orchestra. He has been Principal Bass of the New Hampshire Symphony, Principal Bass of the Boston Philharmonic, and performed two seasons as Principal Bass with the Sarasota Opera Festival.

He has held the role of Principal Bass of the Auckland Philharmonia since 1997 and is a founding member of AOTANGO, an NZ-based quintet specializing in tango and world music.

Elise Bradley conductor/educator

A nassionate musician. award-winning conductor, and internationally respected educator, adjudicator and clinician, Elise Bradley served for many years as the HOD Music at Westlake Girls' High School in Auckland, where she founded the school's internationally renowned choir, Key Cygnetures. She directed the NZ Secondary Students' Choir from 2001-2007, which won numerous international awards. She was also a soloist and member of Voices New Zealand from 1998 -2010. In January 2018, Ms. Bradley was named a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit (MNZM), and in March 2025, it was announced that she is a recipient of the King Charles III Coronation Medal from Canada.

Elise repatriated home to New Zealand at the end of 2021. after 14½ years as the Artistic Director of the Toronto Children's Chorus. During her tenure, the Chorus recorded professionally. commissioned Canadian compositions, collaborated with numerous international and national artists, and represented Toronto and Canada nationally and internationally. Since returning to New Zealand, Elise has become conductor of several school choirs and an adult community choir: Artistic Director/Co-Founder of the New Zealand Children's Choral Academy, and she is also co-director of Aotearoa New Zealand Academy Choir.

Through a nationwide audition, these 12 emerging classical music talents have been selected to participate in the Festival's Young Artist Programme. During the festival week, they receive coaching and mentoring from our Festival artists, rehearse and perform chamber music with one another, share their gifts with the local community and participate in career development workshops to hone their professional skills.

Felicity Tomkins

Other recent international competition accolades include: Lockwood NZ Aria Winner (2023), AIMSGraz Meistersinger Audience Choice (2023), JSRB Bel Canto Award Third Prize (2023), Elizabeth Connell Prize Finalist (2023), Metropolitan Opera Laffont Competition Kentucky District Winner/ Central Region Finalist (2022/23), and Lexus Song Quest DMMF Runner-Up (2022).

Felicity's recent performance highlights include; Auckland Choral (Handel Messiah), AOS/MSO 'Verdi Meets Puccini' (Cio-Cio-San Madama Butterfly), Cincinnati Opera (Military Wife/Soprano 1 The Knock), CCM Opera (Madame Lidoine Dialogues des Carmélites, Jeannette L'amant Anonyme, Mahler Symphony No. 4). Felicity has been a NZOpera Studio Artist (2021), and an AIMSGraz Opera Studio Artist (2023). She is an alumna of the University of Waikato (MMus/BMus(Hons)/BSc), and of the NZ Opera School.



Austin Haynes

Austin is a countertenor, poet, translator (winning the 2023 *takahē* journal's Monica Taylor Poetry Prize) and researcher originally from Kā Muriwai/Arrowtown. He grew up between there and Narrm/ Melbourne. In 2019 he moved to Oxford to study a BA and a Masters in Medieval and Renaissance Literature where he appeared as a soloist with groups including Instruments of Time and Truth, Oxford Bach Soloists, New Chamber Opera and the Selene Consort.

Austin was the 2022 winner of the Herald Sun Aria competition in Melbourne and also won the 2022 City of Kingston Aria prize. In 2024, he came third in the Lexus Song Quest and was a finalist in the NZ Aria, where he won the first prizes for Māori Song and Oratorio. Austin's music studies have been supported by the Isla Baring Prize from the Tait Trust and the Tait White Loewenthal Memorial Prize. He has performed in masterclasses with artists such as Joyce DiDonato, Anthony Roth Costanzo, Emma Kirkby, James Conlon, and Laurence Cummings.

Austin is now pursuing a PhD in Wellington on the history of the translation of songs and literature between English and te reo Māori. His current project is to translate all 154 of Shakespeare's sonnets into te reo Māori.
