FROM THE CREATIVE TEAM

In a world where our gatherings and live concerts have been heavily reduced, the arts and events communities have suffered profoundly. Yet it is artists and music itself that offer so much relief in the way of emotional support and social wellbeing. Music is both a grand public experience yet is often turned to for comfort in trying times – it heralds royalty and rouses stadiums, yet it also soothes and unties personal intractable knots. As musicians have supported us through our own personal and collective hardships, the Whakatipu Music Festival is an opportunity to celebrate music in many forms and honour those artists sharing it with us.

Born from a place of change, the festival is a Covid adaptation and response from the Michael Hill International Violin Competition to the new environment in which we now work. So it seems fitting that the theme this year is 'change'. Although often challenging, change is a beautiful thing. It causes us to grow, evolve, develop and create new ideas.

The very nature of the festival is really a sum of many parts which means, when considering carefully if we were able to proceed amidst the nation's Covid-restrictions, we were confident the small, bespoke and intimate heart of the festival could be delivered safely and meaningfully. It's a good reminder that finding beauty often means drilling down to the smallest of things, collecting our focus and concentrating on what can be. There's an English expression 'Big things come in small packages', but I prefer the Te Reo metaphor 'Ahakoa he iti, he pounamu' which means 'despite being small, it is pounamu.'

A festival of this complexity requires a great deal of skilled and passionate people to pull it off, so thanks go to all of the musicians, sponsors, donors, funders, staff and audience for making the Whakatipu Music Festival such an integral part in the development and enjoyment of the arts and music scene in the community.

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There is no doubt that the most crucial element of an aspiring young musician's training is an abundance of performance experience. This has been in short supply over these last few years, and so it is especially important and wonderful that the Whakatipu Music Festival has stepped into this space to provide such a wide-ranging platform for our finest young talent. Of course the countless hours of personal practice cannot be avoided, and the pandemic was certainly good for introspection and technique-building! But in a very practical sense, the skills of working and performing with others are the most important pathways to a career in music - no performer exists in a vacuum. The variety of opportunities given to these outstanding Young Artists will be invaluable; the bonus is that the concert-going public in the region get to experience these exciting young performers on the cusp of their careers.

Looking back to my training, I can definitely state that the 'festival weeks' were the most important and challenging times of growth for me as a musician - they were, incidentally, also the most fun! There is a great sense of community cohesion around these events, a shared purpose, an expectation of excellence. What is wonderful (and almost unique) about the WMF is the breadth of skills the musicians need to develop - performance, collaboration, communication, outreach - today's musician is required to be so much more than a 'turn up and play' soloist.

On behalf of the Professional Artists at the Festival may I say we are delighted to be part of this journey too - this is not just a two-way street, but a bustling intersection where inspiration arrives from all directions, and we feed off the enthusiasm and ideas of each other: musicians, audience, supporters, community. We are looking forward to sharing the music with you!

Stephen De Pledge Pianist and Artistic Adviser Last year I had the pleasure of being asked to participate in the Community section of the Whakatipu Music Festival, and with my students and the extraordinary Mark Wilson, we created a special performance to showcase excerpts from "Hamilton". For my students, this performance was a turning point - they gained a new appreciation for different types of music (other than contemporary), a new appreciation for the skills and talents of those living in their community, and the appreciation of the elaborate layers needed for effective composition. The lift to master their instrument (the voice) and their performance was exhilarating and performing on the festival's stage was inspiring.

A team of four of us: Kinga Krupa (Kinga Krupa Music), Emma Wilson (Turn Up The Music) and Alison Price (Head of Music Dept, WHS) and I have supported this year's festival as Community Consultants. We have worked hard to pull this event together despite the consistent setbacks of working within the upsets and upheavals of Covid. This year we continue to highlight our wonderful community's love of music illustrating a full range of talents from local young singers and instrumentalists through to our broader international and cultural community. Unfortunately, many of our performers and ensembles were unable to participate due to Covid and the obstacles it has presented for rehearsals.

I am delighted to be a part of this stellar team, and even more delighted to be able to include so many diverse talented and dedicated musicians in this year's festival. I hope that you will give equal time and interest to our community performers alongside the already impressive line-up the festival has insured.

Tararua' (meaning 'two peaks') connects whakapapa. From mountains in both North and South Islands, this contemporary New Zealand art music weaves the voices of Aoraki, the tūrakawaewae (tribal home) of Ruby Solly and Ariana Tikao, winding through South Island raised, Wellington-based artist Al Fraser, and merging into Phil Boniface's birthplace and connection with the Tararua ranges.

This evocative music combines taonga pūoro, waiata, karakia and pūrākau (story) with a strong southern Māori influence, with the western instrumental elements of the cello and doublebass. The ensemble is made up of four established artists who are each leaders in their various fields.

Lucy Mulgan *Colour in Twilight,* commissioned by the Whakatipu Music Festival

Colour in Twilight is a celebration of autumn in Central Otago- written especially for all of the musicians involved in this festival and to mirror the April surroundings.

The piece opens with a bang and a wallop! A triumphant statement of autumn, our here and now with the refrain "colour so bright, as if in twilight". Sliding (literally) into a brief recapturing of the heat - a wordless summer samba - fun and funky rhythms accompanied by claps and scat sounds in the choir. From here it slides back to the present - exploring the autumnal colour and mood that accompanies it. Rich, warm, lush lines move and morph through all the instruments and voices. This builds into the climax - the centre of the piece, where everyone improvises within their own cell - whero, karaka or kōwhai. Finally, a verse of autumn and then into the coda - looking ahead with a winter waltz - a rising melody in the lower instruments accompanied by thin, icy textures. The tune and wordless choir echo a summer samba.

Ending as we started, with a blast of celebratory sound and colour.



Lucy Mulgan **COMPOSER**

A composer and bass player from Aotearoa New Zealand, Lucy works in a variety of musical styles. Her compositions range from sweeping orchestral landscapes to quirky original songs and her music has been played across Europe and NZ. As a bass player, she works regularly in the worlds of opera and jazz, and as a community music workshop leader Lucy helps people explore their own voices through singing, composition and storytelling.

In 1992 she graduated from the Wellington Conservatorium of Music with a diploma in Jazz Performance and worked in NZ as a composer and bass player before moving to the UK in 1996. There she studied at York University, obtaining a PhD in composition in 2004.

Currently Lucy divides her time between London and the South Coast of the UK, while remaining connected to the New Zealand music community both as a participant and ambassador.

Lucy's music has been performed by the New Zealand Symphony Orchestra, NZ Opera, Orchestra Wellington, BBC Philharmonic (UK), Northern Sinfonia (UK), Saxcess, Ethos, juice vocal ensemble (UK), members of The Hilliard Ensemble (UK) and broadcast on BBC World (TV), BBC Radio 3 & 4, Concert FM and Radio NZ.

Madeleine Pierard **SOPRANO**

Award-winning soprano, Madeleine Pierard was a Jette Parker Young Artist with The Royal Opera, Covent Garden, where she has since sung numerous roles, including Contessa di Folleville (*Il Viaggio a Reims*), Musetta (*La Boheme* - London/Istanbul), Lisa (*La Sonnambula*), Berta, Noémie (*Cendrillon*) and Costanza (*L'isola disabitata*).

Other recent roles include Lady Macbeth with English Touring Opera; Violetta, Pat Nixon, Miss Jessel and Musetta with NZ Opera; Musetta at the Royal Albert Hall; Louise and Elettra for The Buxton Festival; the title role in Rufus Wainwright's *Prima Donna* and Mrs Julian *(Owen Wingrave)* with Grange Park Opera, UK.

Concert appearances include the *Beethoven 9* at The Barbican and Britten's *War Requiem* at the Cadogan Hall with the RPO; numerous appearances with the NZSO and throughout Europe, including l'Orchestre Symphonique de Bretagne and Orchestre Symphonique de Strasbourg. In recital, Madeleine has performed at the Wigmore and Cadogan Halls, Royal Albert Hall and The Royal Opera House.

Madeleine is a noted interpreter of contemporary repertoire and has premiered numerous works.

Madeleine is a teacher and mentor for The Royal Opera in London, and was recently named the inaugural Dame Malvina Major Chair in Opera at Te Whare Wānanga o Waikato.



Robin Wilson VIOLIN

Internationally regarded pedagogue Dr Robin Wilson was born in Dunedin. Currently he is Head of Violin at the Australian National Academy of Music in Melbourne and regularly serves on the faculty of the Keshet Eilon International String Mastercourse in Israel and Valdres Festival in Norway and in 2022 will also teach at Morningside Music Bridge at The New England Conservatory in Boston. Previously he held appointments at the University of Sydney and the University of Queensland. Robin is regularly invited to give masterclasses in Australasia, Asia, Israel, the UK and the USA and his students are major prizewinners of international competitions, hold principal positions and regularly perform as soloists in Australia and overseas. In 2018 he received a National Award from the Australian String Teachers Association for outstanding services to the string community in Australia.

Robin has performed at major venues and festivals throughout Australia, USA and the UK and has recorded solo and chamber music for Decca, ABC Classics, Vexations840 and VDE-Gallo. A member of the acclaimed Ironwood ensemble, he is a former leader of the ARCO Chamber Orchestra and has appeared as guest violinist with many leading Australian ensembles. Robin's research into the historically informed performance of Brahms's music was awarded the prestigious Geiringer Prize from the American Brahms Society and he has presented lectures and recitals at international conferences and institutions including Stanford and Yale Universities, City University of New York, University of Colorado, Leeds University, Royal College of Music London and the Royal Northern College of Music Manchester.

Robin studied in Sydney with Alice Waten and Janet Davies, and with James Buswell at the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston. He plays on a violin made by the Gagliano family in Naples in 1784.



Andrew Joyce **CELLO**

Before joining the NZSO in September 2010, Andrew spent five years freelancing in London, during which time he worked regularly with the London Symphony and London Philharmonic Orchestras, touring and performing in the world's great concert halls. He also played as Guest Principal with Northern Sinfonia, Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra and the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra. A dedicated chamber musician, Andrew co-founded the Puertas Quartet who have performed in both the UK and New Zealand to great critical acclaim, and recorded two CDs for Atoll Records.

He performs regularly in a trio with pianist Diedre Irons and NZSO Concertmaster, Vesa-Matti Leppänen.

Born in Norwich, England, at 11 he went to London to pursue his musical studies at the Purcell School of Music where his teachers were Amanda Truelove and Michal Kaznowski. He continued his studies at the Royal College of Music with Alexander Boyarsky and the Musikhochschule Lübeck with Troels Svane, as a holder of the coveted DAAD Scholarship. He has performed in masterclasses with the late Bernard Greenhouse, Alexander Baillie, David Geringas, Alexander Rudin, Natalia Gutman, Karine Georgian, Leonid Gorokhov, the Takacs Quartet and the Kopelman Quartet. Violinist, and Artistic Director of the Netherlands Chamber Orchestra, Gordan Nikolitch, also played a very important role in his artistic development and continues to be a source of inspiration.

He plays a beautiful old English cello by Thomas Dodd, c.1800, kindly loaned to him by Old and New Strings Ltd.



Bridget Douglas

Bridget is Section Principal Flute of the NZSO and an Artist Teacher in Flute at the New Zealand School of Music – Te Kōkī. She graduated from Victoria and Otago Universities before travelling to the USA for postgraduate study with the assistance of a Fulbright Graduate Award. While in New York, Bridget won the New York Flute Club and Artists International Competitions resulting in debut recitals at Carnegie and CAMI Halls.

Bridget mentors young musicians throughout New Zealand and is passionate about collaborative ways of making music. She is a founding member of the contemporary music ensemble Stroma and enjoys playing a diverse range of chamber music.

Bridget is actively involved in performing and commissioning NZ composers to create music that is unique to Aotearoa. She has released several CDs of both New Zealand and international music, three of which were shortlisted for Best Classical Album by the Vodafone New Zealand Music Awards. In 2020 she was awarded the CANZ (Composers Association of NZ) KBB Citation for Services to NZ Music.





Tararua Ensemble

Ruby Solly is a Kai Tahu musician, taonga pūoro practitioner, music therapist and writer living in Wellington. She has played with artists such as Yo-Yo Ma, Whirimako Black, Trinity Roots, and The New Zealand String Quartet as both a cellist, and a player of ngā taonga pūoro. Ruby is also a script writer and published poet and has exhibited poetry in Antarctica, America and New Zealand, and was a runner up for the 2019 Caselberg Trust International Poetry Prize.

Phil Boniface is a New Zealand/Canadian bassist, composer and educator. As a double bassist and graduate of The New Zealand School of Music he has performed with leading contemporary jazz artists in New Zealand and abroad. Having spent more than a decade residing in North America, he performed, recorded and studied with many of Canada's finest jazz musicians, including private study with US jazz bass legend John Clayton, as well as multiple performances in the Vancouver International Jazz Festival leading his own groups.

Ariana Tikao is a singer, composer, and leading player of taonga pūoro. She writes waiata exploring themes relating to her Kāi Tahu identity and mana wāhine, often drawing upon historical kõrero from her ancestors. Ariana's music has featured on television, film, theatre, dance, and in online media. She recently was awarded the Jillian Friedlander Te Moana-Nui-a-Kiwa award and was named as a 2020 Arts Laureate by the Arts Foundation of New Zealand.

Alistair Fraser (Pākehā) is a manu whakatangitangi a ngā taonga pūoro, a player, composer, maker and researcher of ngā taonga pūoro who has been making, performing and composing with these musical instruments since 1999. Al has elegantly woven taonga pūoro into many projects that are recognised as being at the forefront of Aotearoa arts practice and puoro Māori.



Stephen De Pledge PIANO

New Zealand pianist Stephen De Pledge performs internationally as a soloist and chamber musician. He studied with Joan Havill at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama in London, where he won the Gold Medal in his final year. He subsequently spent two years at a Junior Fellow at the Royal College of Music, and studied in Paris with Yvonne Loriod. After winning the NFMS Young Concert Artist Award he made his debuts in the Wigmore Hall, Queen Elizabeth Hall and Barbican Hall in London and has since given concerto performances with the BBC Scottish Symphony, Bournemouth Symphony, New London and Philharmonia Orchestras, amongst others.

Solo performances in recent seasons have taken him to Tokyo, Cologne, Paris and New York, as well as throughout New Zealand, where he has been based since 2010. He has performed with many musicians, including Dame Felicity Lott, Dame Evelyn Glennie and Viktoria Mullova. His extensive discography includes works by Bliss, Barber, Messiaen, Shostakovich and Brahms, and premiere recordings of Arvo Pärt, Henryk Gorecki, Ned Rorem and the 1st piano concerto of Lyell Cresswell for Naxos, which was written for him in 2012.

In addition to his performing schedule Stephen De Pledge has a teaching position in the piano department at the School of Music, University of Auckland.

YOUNG ARTIST PROGRAMME

Through a national online audition process, we have selected and invited 12 of New Zealand's top emerging classical music talents to participate in the Festival's Young Artist Programme. During the festival week, they receive coaching and mentoring from our Festival artists, rehearse and perform chamber music with one another, share their gifts with the local community and participate in career development workshops to hone their professional skills.

Since moving back home to Auckland in September, Begonia has been offered a casual position in the Auckland Philharmonia Orchestra and also recently been accepted into their fellowship programme. As a multidimensional being, she is passionate about exploring new realms and paving new paths inside & outside of music, she is also a certified Holistic Wellness Coach, creating safe space for open conversations and raising awareness around wellness in the creative industry.



Jessica Chi PIANO

Jessica Chi started her piano lessons in China at the age of four. Her first recital was in Shenyang when she was five; three years later she won the National Beilei Piano Competition. In 2015, Jessica's family moved to New Zealand, where for four years her teacher was the Russian pianist and piano teacher Mikhail Tablis. During that time, Jessica passed the Trinity College London LTCL Diploma exam with high distinction and won several first and second places in piano competitions including the New Zealand Institute of Registered Music Teachers (IRMT) Scholarships, Alice Cole annual Piano Scholarship for young pianists of outstanding ability and she came third at the New Zealand Young Performer of the Year competition.

In 2020, Jessica was admitted to the Royal Conservatory of Music but deferred her attendance due to the impact of the coronavirus. She instead attended the online international great composers competition in the US and has won several first and second prizes. She was also selected as one of the musicians to participate in the Adams summer school in 2021, and was awarded the Donald Armstrong prize. Currently, Jessica is an Auckland University School of Music student, where her teacher is Sarah Watkins.

Away from piano performing, Jessica enjoys composing, painting, 3D animating and is a freelance illustrator.



Peter Gjelsten VIOLIN

Peter has been learning the violin since 2009 through the Suzuki Method with Lynley Culliford until he graduated high school. In 2021, Peter began his studies at the New Zealand School of Music studying with Monique Lapins.

Peter has been playing chamber music since 2011. He entered the NZCT Chamber Music competition for five years and won the first prize award in 2019 playing viola, and again in 2020 playing violin. He was coached by members of the NZSQ in both these years. Peter has been attending the Adam Summer School since 2020. He is the first violinist of the Eden Quartet, who in July of 2021 performed their own concert series in Auckland and Wellington with Steinway Artist Jason Bae. They have gained many fans in Wellington from their early morning busking sessions in the Wellington Railway Station.

Clare Hood is a coloratura soprano who has recently completed postgraduate studies under Jane Irwin at the Royal Northern College of Music (RNCM). Clare was a semi-finalist in the 2021 Sydney Eisteddfod Aria Scholarship (cancelled due to COVID) and will debut this year with NZ Opera in their production of a new opera by Luke di Somma, *The Unruly Tourists*.
